


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

Beauty in Postmodern Thought


Beauty is a purely social construction in the eyes of the Postmodern thinker. Beauty is an illusion in the eye of the beholder, a series of signs fabricated to create the impression of meaning, conditioned by social conventions, shaped by class, race, nation, gender, and ideology. A gesture by one group to raise its status and authority over another group. Beauty is all surface; its deeper meaning is a social construction. Postmodern thinkers even have a wonderful term for beauty: it is "a pleasure technology." It is neither true nor universal. It is a sort of consumer product; something made rather than discovered. Beauty in the Bible

- The universe is intrinsically beautiful.
- God made us with the ability to see, recognize this beauty.
- Upon recognizing his beauty, God wants us to glorify him.

2 Samuel 11:2


Effects of the Fall

- Even God's good gift of beauty can be turned inward and corrupted into sin.
- Sin mars both the beauty (order) of God's creation, and our ability to recognize it.
- Sin makes us unwilling to glorify God, even when we do recognize the beauty of creation.

4. Beauty isn't always "Pretty"

Paradox of Beauty

- To say that beauty is a "sensory experience" is to cheapen it.
- Beauty can affect us holistically: physically, emotionally, intellectually, and spiritually.
- Something may please the senses and not be beautiful.
- Conversely, something may be beautiful that does not necessarily please the senses.

5. Humanity needs objective Beauty

Why Objective Beauty?

"Beauty is a true and powerful way of looking into the nature of reality." —Dana Gioia

To discredit beauty as an objective reality is to deny the reality of God's existence.

Why Objective Beauty?

"[God] exults not only in His own creation but also in the creations and aesthetic satisfaction of His children." —Gene E. Veith, Jr.

A subjective view of beauty prohibits us from truly enjoying art & creation as God intended.

The Miracle of Beauty

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn over all creation... All things were created through Him and for Him. And He is before all things, and in Him all things consist.

The Miracle of Beauty
